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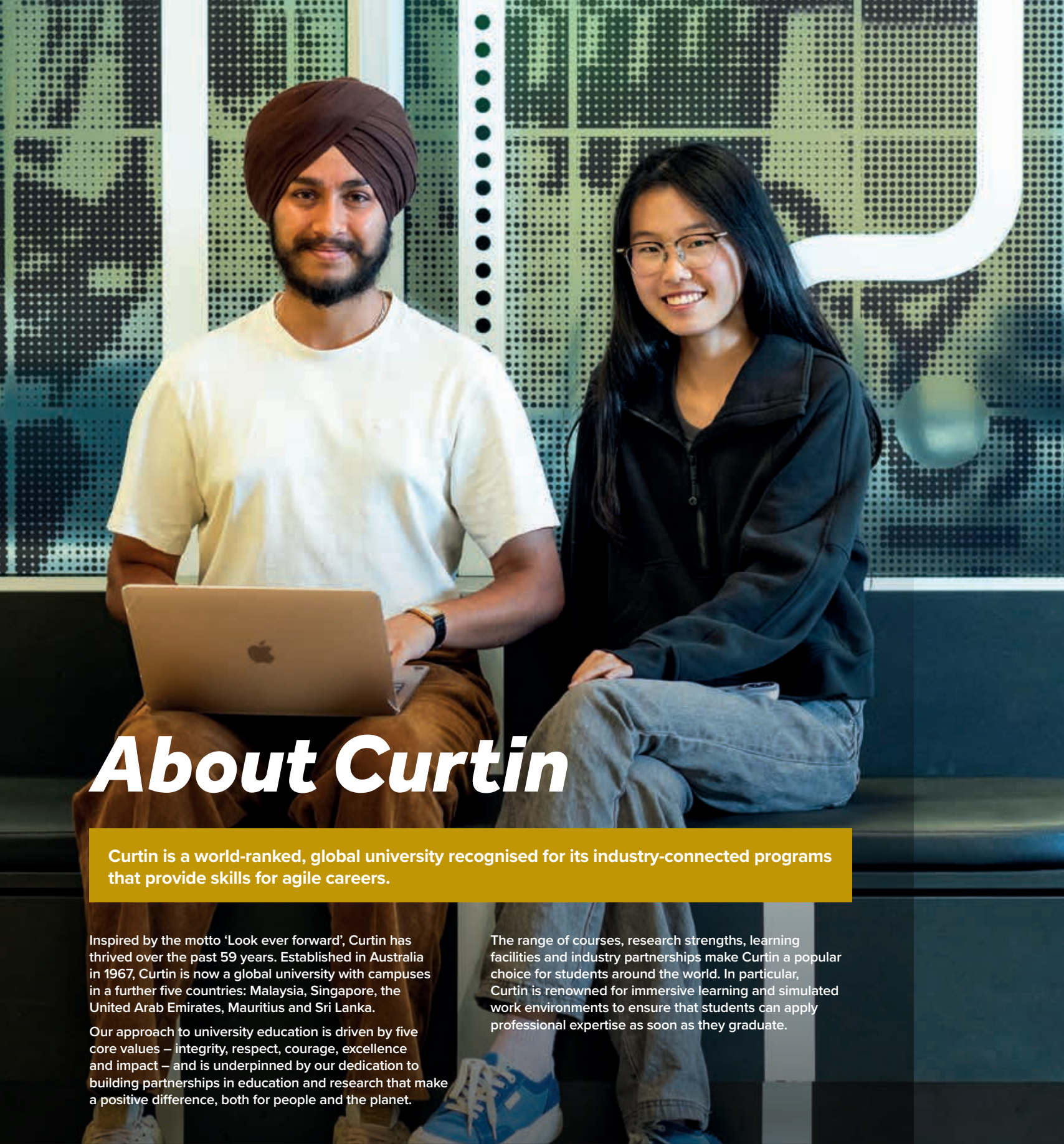

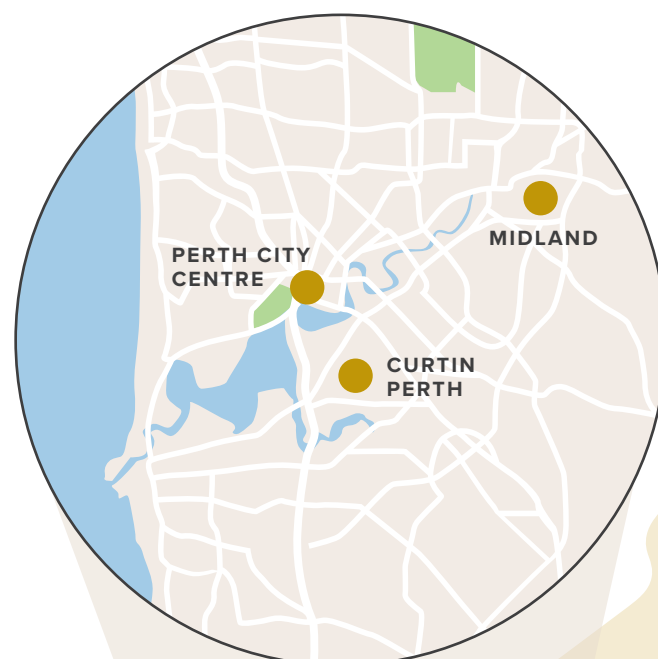

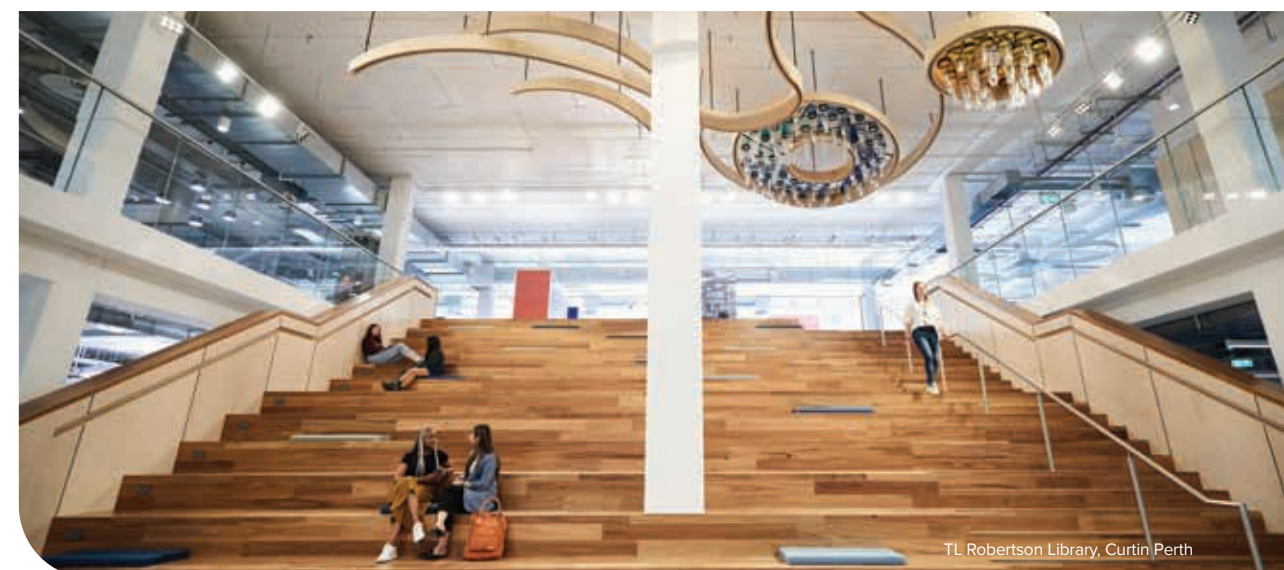

Perth's coastline features breathtaking beaches and scenery, including Rottnest Island (Wadjemup). The island is a significant cultural site for the Noongar people and home to the friendly quokka.

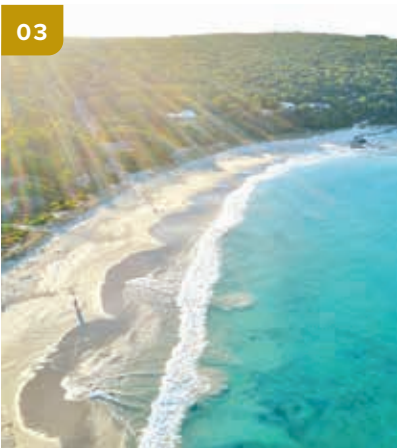

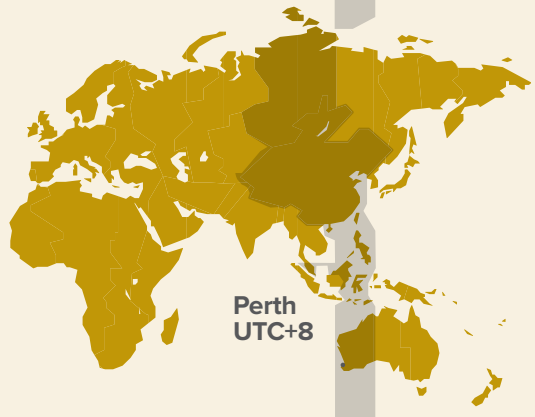

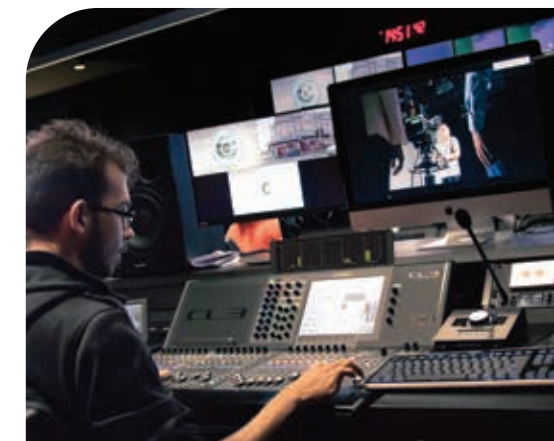

Choosing what to study



Our degrees provide opportunities to choose from a range of subjects, giving you the freedom to study towards your dream career and pursue your personal interests at the same time.

Bachelor degrees

Single degrees

A single degree is three to five years of full-time study in one specific subject. You'll graduate with in-depth knowledge in your field.

Double degrees

Some of our degrees can be paired with another degree to broaden your knowledge and skills across two complementary learning areas. You'll graduate with more career choices and the flexibility to adapt to changing employment trends.

Postgraduate courses

Specialise in your field, advance your career or pivot to a new industry with a postgraduate course.

Graduate certificates and diplomas

Advance your expertise or build specialist knowledge in your chosen field. Complete these graduate qualifications in six months or one year.

Master degrees

This high-level qualification enables you to apply advanced knowledge and best practice to a range of professional situations. Some master degree courses involve conducting independent research.

A higher degree by research from Curtin gives you scope to pursue a specialist area in your field, build knowledge in your profession and contribute to important research.

Majors and specialisations

Depending on your course, you can mix majors (usually a series of eight* units) with specialisations (a series of four units) to broaden your professional expertise and deepen your industry knowledge – which will improve your career opportunities and ability to pursue your professional goals.

Studying specialisations can give you the exact skill set you want for your chosen career.

* Note that engineering majors are a series of 19 or 20 units.

- Cambridge C1 Advanced Test (C1 Advanced)
- Michigan English Test (MET)
- Occupational English Test (OET).³

If you don't have a recent English language test result, you can complete the Password test. This is a free online language test that will determine your English starting level. Your score can be used for entry into all Curtin English courses.

Once you enrol in Curtin English and pass the Curtin English program, you will not need to take another external test to grade your English proficiency.

Curtin English Scholarship⁴

If you have been offered an English package with your Curtin course admission offer (conditional on passing the Curtin English program), you will be eligible to receive up to A\$7,758 towards your English tuition – which may cover the full cost of your English course.

This scholarship is available to international students who are studying Gateway English and/or English Language Bridging as a pathway to Curtin University and Curtin College.

You do not need to apply for the scholarship, as we will advise if you are eligible when you receive your conditional offer.

If you are eligible, you will only need to accept your conditional offer and commence the Curtin English course outlined in the offer to be admitted to the scholarship program. You will receive the scholarship after completing your English course and your first semester at Curtin University.⁵

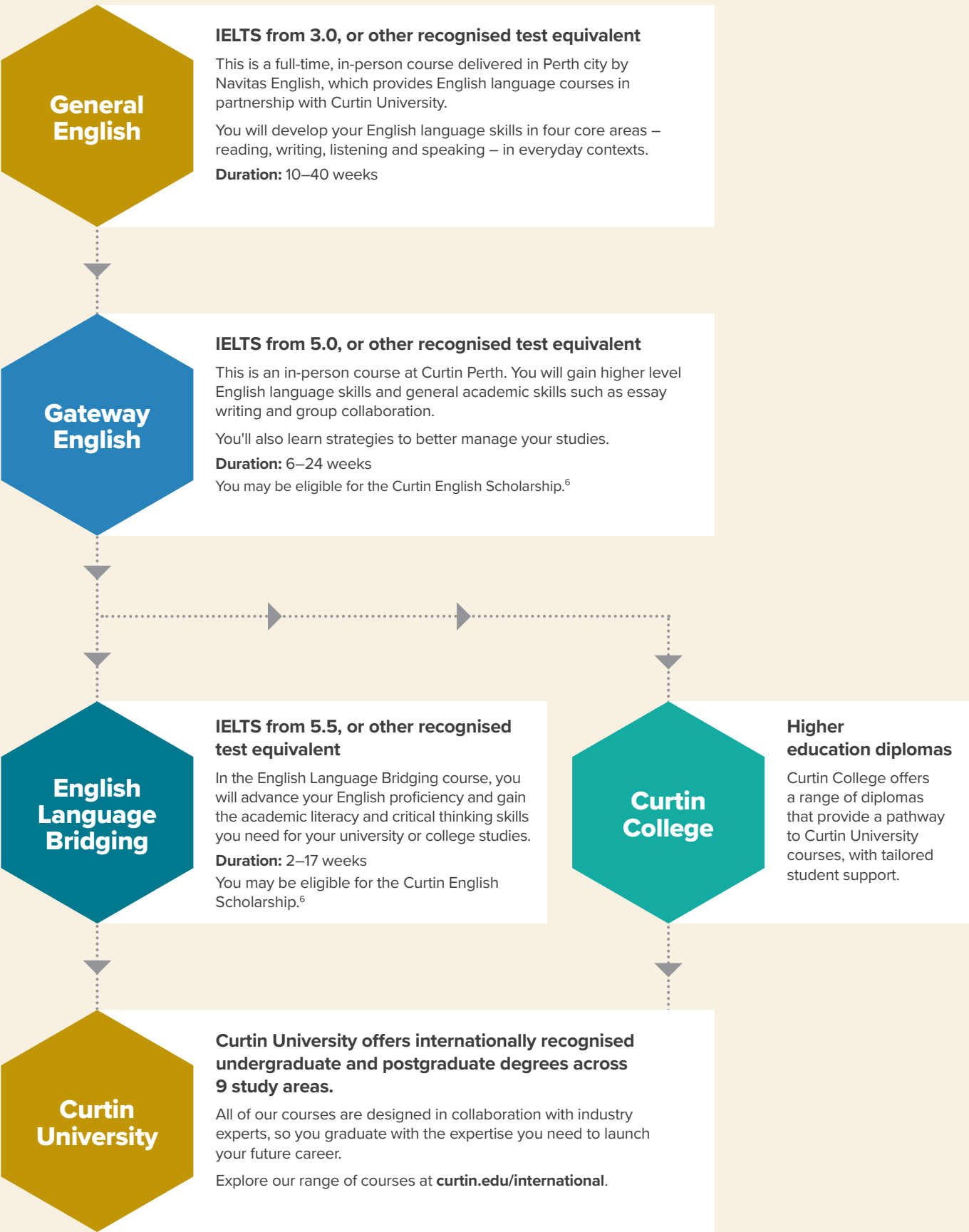

Curtin College

Curtin College is ideal if you have completed the equivalent of Australia's year 11 or year 12 in your home country and gained a high school graduate certification, but you don't meet the criteria for direct entry to your chosen Curtin course.

Curtin College offers diploma courses that are equivalent to year one of a Curtin University bachelor degree. You can study units that lead to a Stage 2 Diploma qualification, enabling you to gain direct entry into year two of your chosen Curtin course (see the diagram below). Curtin College also offers a Masters Qualifying Program (MQP) pathway, which provides a pathway to Curtin University postgraduate degrees.

Curtin College is based at Curtin Perth, so you will enjoy access to the same services and facilities as Curtin University students, making your transition to university a comfortable one.

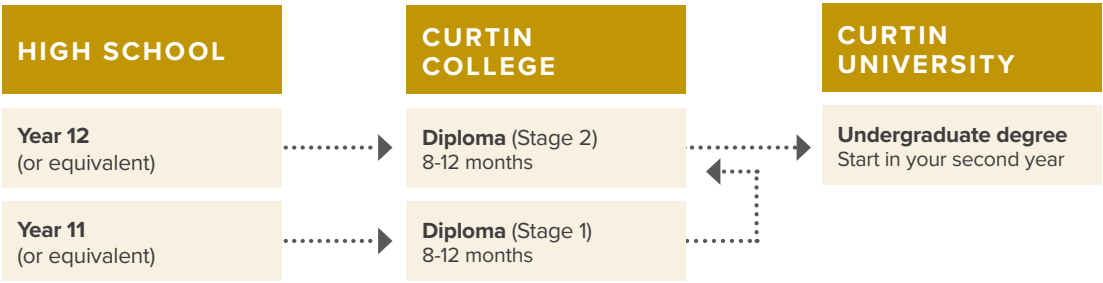

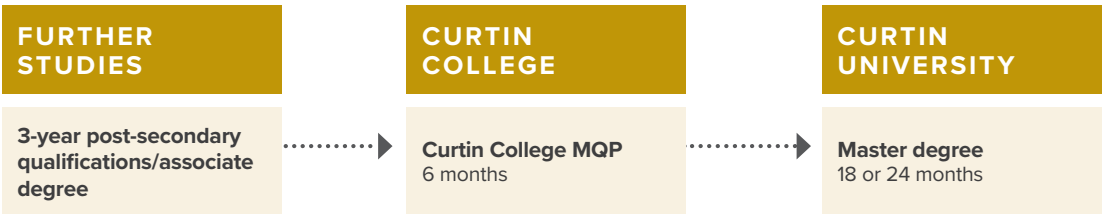

How to apply

Applying to Curtin is an exciting step towards your future. The simplest way to apply is through an agent, but you can also apply to us directly through our website.

1. Choose your course

Explore your course options in this guide or at curtin.edu/study.

2. Check the course admission criteria

General and prerequisites

Academic entry requirements, such as cut-off scores and prerequisite subjects, vary by course. View the entry requirements on the course page for further details.

English language proficiency

Check your country's equivalent English language proficiency scores at curtin.edu/accepted-english.

You can meet our English language requirements by completing the Curtin English programs or other recognised tests. Find out more at curtin.edu/meet-english.

Other criteria

Some courses will list supplementary information you need to submit with your application, such as a résumé, a personal statement or professional references.

Some courses also have inherent requirements. Learn more at curtin.edu/requirements-inherent.

If you are interested in undertaking a research degree course, you must submit an Expression of Interest and receive an invitation from your potential supervisor before submitting an application. Find out more at curtin.edu/research-apply.

3. Submit your application

Apply through an agent

To find an agent who will manage your application efficiently, visit curtin.edu/agents.

Apply directly to Curtin

To apply directly, go to the relevant course page, click 'Apply now' and follow the prompts. Alternatively, visit curtin.edu/application-portal.

4. Await a response

If your application is successful, you will receive a full or conditional offer to study with us. You can accept your offer via the Applicant Portal.

Once you accept your offer and meet all conditions outlined in it, you will receive a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) – a document from Curtin that details your course, study duration and tuition fees. This document is required to apply for a student visa.

Please note, we are unable to provide a preliminary document evaluation to determine course eligibility. Your unique situation, including citizenship, current location and previous study, must be considered by our Global Admissions team before an offer can be made to you.

You can apply for free. Your Letter of Offer will inform you of any conditions, Credit for Recognised Learning and subsidies/scholarships awarded to you by our Global Admissions team.



Applying when you have accessibility needs

If you have a disability or health condition, there are support services and resources to help you succeed in your studies.

Managing your finances

Before you start your course, find out how much it will cost and look at ways to manage your budget.

Understand your tuition fees

You will need to pay tuition fees for each unit you undertake at Curtin.

The amount you pay will depend on the course you are studying and the units you enrol in. As an international student, you'll maintain full-time enrolment throughout your studies.

All tuition fees are subject to annual increases of up to 8%. To see the student fee contribution for each unit and to find out more about fees, visit curtin.edu/int-fees.

Plan for other expenses

Tuition fees do not cover the cost of some items required for studying a particular unit or course. Examples of these items include but are not limited to:

- textbooks
- field trips
- first aid courses
- lab coats
- Working With Children Check.

You may incur day-to-day study-related expenses, such as transport and parking costs.

As an international student, you must also obtain Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) for the length of your student visa.

Getting to Curtin Perth

Find your best way to Curtin Perth. Located in Bentley, just six kilometres from the city centre, the campus is easy to reach with plenty of safe, affordable and sustainable travel options.



Cycle or ride in

Pedal, roll or glide to campus on your bike, e-bike or e-scooter and make the most of Curtin's excellent end-of-trip facilities. You'll find secure bike racks, e-rideable charging stations, and changerooms with showers and lockers conveniently located across campus.

Catch a Transperth bus or train

Commute to Curtin using public transport. The campus has two main bus terminals – Curtin Bus Station on the east side and Curtin Central Bus Station on the north-west – both offering connections to nearby train stations.

Buses

More than 500 buses stop at Curtin each weekday during semester. High-frequency routes 100 and 101 connect with Canning Bridge Station, while routes 998, 999 and 960 link with Oats Street Station and Perth city. The Circle Route buses run every 15 minutes between Perth's universities, train stations and shopping centres, from 6.30am to 8pm.

Don't forget: full-time students can access Transperth travel concessions for discounted fares.

Trains

- Mandurah line: Take a train to Canning Bridge Station, then hop on a connecting bus to Curtin – with services every seven or eight minutes during peak times.
- Armadale and Thornlie–Cockburn lines: Travel to Cannington or Oats Street stations and catch a connecting bus straight to campus.
- Yanchep, Ellenbrook, Midland, Airport/High Wycombe and Fremantle lines: Most trains run to Perth Station, where you can transfer to a Curtin-bound bus or take a Mandurah line train to Canning Bridge.

Hop on a curtinlink bus

Curtinlink is a free, on-demand bus service for getting to campus from local suburbs. With no fixed routes or timetables, you simply book a ride through the curtinlink app, which shows nearby pick-up points and live bus tracking. Find out how it works and where it operates at curtin.edu/link-bus.

Glossary

Course types

Bachelor degree

The standard university award recognised worldwide for completing an undergraduate course.

- **Double degree:** Studying two complementary bachelor degrees concurrently – for example, Bachelor of Laws, Bachelor of Arts.
- **Honours degree:** Additional research and coursework at an advanced level.

Pathway course

A course such as Curtin's Bachelor of Science (Health Sciences) or Bachelor of Multidisciplinary Science, in which you can complete the prerequisite subjects for entry to other Curtin courses.

Postgraduate degree

A qualification after a bachelor degree.

Undergraduate study

Education that leads to your first qualification from a university, usually a bachelor degree.

Course structure

Clinical placement

Supervised experience in a clinical setting.

Fieldwork

Approved external practical work, teaching, study, volunteer or research activities. Examples include field trips, clinical/work placements, practicums and study tours.

Major

A series of units in the same discipline within a bachelor degree. A major includes two or more units at final-year level.

- **Double major:** Studying two majors within a degree course. For example, Bachelor of Commerce (Economics and Finance).

Minor

A series of four units in a discipline. A minor can be from the same discipline or a different discipline from your major.

Professional placement or internship

Professional work in an industry setting, undertaken to extend your knowledge and skills.

Specialisation

A series of four units in a discipline. A specialisation may either align with or differ from your major discipline.

Unit

A component of a course that covers a subject area in detail. A unit may include lectures, tutorials, class presentations, group work, computer lab sessions, case studies, workplace assignments and exams.

- **Core unit:** A compulsory unit in a course.
- **Elective unit:** A non-compulsory unit chosen from any discipline, provided that you meet the prerequisites.
- **Optional unit:** A unit chosen from a designated list offered in a course.

Course essentials

Accreditation

The formal recognition of a course by an accrediting organisation.

ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank)

- **Guaranteed ATAR:** A rank that guarantees you entry to the course, provided that you meet all prerequisites.
- **Minimum ATAR:** The minimum rank you need to be considered for entry to a course.

Duration

The time it takes to complete the course when studying full-time.

Inherent requirements

Essential requirements or characteristics (mental, physical and emotional) necessary to complete a course or a course component.

Intake

The semester/trimester when you can begin studying the course.

- **Semester:** There are two semesters per calendar year, each comprising a 16-week study period.
- **Trimester:** There are three trimesters per calendar year, each comprising a 14-week study period.

Note that you may complete studies in other study periods, such as an Extended Delivery Period or a Special Study Period.

Location

Curtin campuses that offer the course.

Portfolio entry

A pathway into Curtin courses if you are studying General subjects or a combination of ATAR, General and/or VET certificates at school; or you exited school without an ATAR.

Prerequisite

A subject or unit that must be completed before starting a course or a higher-level unit.

Professional recognition

Formal acknowledgement of professional status, which may be required to practise in a specific profession.

STAT (Skills for Tertiary Admissions Test)

A test that can be used to meet the general admission criteria for select courses, and Curtin's English requirement. Learn more at tisc.edu.au/static/stat.tisc.

Study mode

- **Full-time:** Either three or four units per semester.
- **Part-time:** Either one or two units per semester.

International students studying in Australia on a student visa must study four units per semester for most courses. A small number of courses allow a study load of three units.

VET entry

A pathway into Curtin courses for applicants studying a VET Certificate IV or higher from a registered organisation.

Other university terms

Credit for recognised learning (CRL)

Recognition of any previous study or work experience you have that may exempt you from having to study some units of your degree. Also known as advanced standing.

Faculty

A designated teaching area comprising university schools and disciplines.

International students

Students studying in Australia on a student visa. International students studying in Australia on a student visa must study four units per semester for most courses. A small number of courses allow a study load of three units.

TISC

The Tertiary Institutions Service Centre (TISC) processes university applications on behalf of WA's public universities and administers STAT.

WACE

Western Australian Certificate of Education.
